Scam prevention meeting planned for Nov. 5 at Waitsburg Town Hall

WAITSBURG — Anyone with a cellular or internet connection has most likely experienced scam attempts. These attempts take many forms and keep changing as safeguards are put in place.

On November 5, 2025, Karen Huwe, Pastor Heidi Lum, and the Town Hall Board are hosting a scam intervention and information meeting for seniors. The event will take place at 10:30 a.m. at the Waitsburg Town Hall.

Speakers will include representatives from the Waitsburg branch of Banner Bank and the Walla Walla Sheriff's Office.

In recent weeks, residents have not only received scam communications but at least seven have lost money by engaging with them. Most of the scams were emails or texts about unpaid utility bills. The scammers claim the recipient is at risk of immediate action to shut off their services if they do not respond and pay the past balance.

These emails often look legitimate, with logos and letterhead copied from the actual utility provider. If you receive an email or text saying your account is past due and you are going to lose service, do not respond to the email or text. Go to the utility's website or call the support phone number on your bill to see if there is a problem with your bill.

Other scams targeting seniors include Facebook messages from people claiming to be friends or relatives who need bail money. An older person can also be vulnerable to phone calls from someone claiming to be a grandchild who needs bail money or help with another emergency.

Possibly the most emotionally and financially deceptive are romance scams. Romance scams on Facebook involve scammers who create fake profiles to manipulate people into relationships, and then steal money. They often claim to be overseas in the military or working abroad. They quickly profess love while avoiding video calls.

Red flags include asking for money (especially via gift cards or cryptocurrency), having inconsistent stories, a limited online presence, and pressuring you to move the conversation to another app. Often, their profile will show few friends or posts.

There is a Hulu documentary series, "Hey Beautiful: Anatomy of a Romance Scam," that follows victims of the same scam as they meet to uncover the truth. Over three episodes, the women find the man in the photos and the criminal organization behind it all.

The Hulu documentary shows how good internet criminals are at building trust and intimacy with their victims. Even after family members and friends tried to intervene, some of the women continued to believe their online relationships were genuine.

This is a very lucrative scam, and victims often lose tens of thousands of dollars. In the movie, some of the women lost their entire life savings and assets.

These women are not unique; they are our neighbors, friends, or family members. Learning how to recognize scams will help us protect ourselves and our community.

"The Waitsburg Times" is planning a series of internet and social media fact-checking and safety workshops and town halls in Waitsburg and Dayton over the next six months. These events will be open to the public and free.

Community organizations launch Walla Walla Valley Hunger Relief Coalition

Donations will help address potential loss of SNAP benefits.

WALLA WALLA— Dozens of community organizations announced a coordinated response to fight hunger through the Walla Walla Valley Hunger Relief Coalition (WVHRC), led by Blue Mountain Action Council. The coalition is asking community members to donate funds and food to the WVHRC to address the possibility that the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), also known as food stamps, will not issue benefits on November 1 due to the federal government shutdown.

SNAP benefits help over 42 million Americans, including seniors, veterans, people with disabilities, and working families. According to the Department of Social and Health Services, in the broader Walla Walla region, over 4,000 households receive over \$1.3 million in monthly grocery assistance from local stores. Local food pantries and meal programs do not have the capacity to respond to the scale of this need. Funds donated through the WVHRC campaign will primarily be used to purchase food cards from local grocery stores, which will be donated to qualifying households throughout the region. This strategy will also help ensure that local grocery stores benefit from this additional revenue.

"Our region has always prided itself on collaboration, and the size of this need is more than any one organization can address. By coordinating our efforts, we will be able to feed more families by purchasing food cards and food in bulk," said BMAC CEO Danielle Garbe Reser. "We invite all community members and organizations to join with us to support area families and our local grocery stores."

Host a food drive. Businesses, churches, organizations, or families can organize a food drive using BMAC's "Do It Yourself Kit" available on their website.

Anyone in need of food assistance can access the local network of food pantries and meal programs. A current schedule is available at www.bmacww.org. BMAC will announce the dates, times, and locations for food card distribution days to current SNAP recipients in the coming days.

Any organization, business, or individual wishing to join the coalition can email Walla Walla County Department of Human Services Manager, Sam Jackle, at sjackle@wwco.wa.gov or attend a WVHRC meeting. Meetings will be held on Mondays from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. at the BMAC Main Office, 8 E. Cherry Street. WVHRC intends to continue operating while the federal government remains closed to provide local service coordination and assistance.

DAYTON — Casper (voiced by Malachi Pearson) is a kind young ghost who peacefully haunts a mansion in Maine. When paranormal therapist James Harvey (Bill Pullman) arrives to communicate with the mansion’s spirits, he brings along his teenage daughter, Kat (Christina Ricci). Casper falls for Kat, but their budding relationship is complicated not only by his transparent state but also by his troublemaking apparition uncles and their mischievous antics. The cast includes Christina Ricci, Bill Pullman, Cathy Moriarty, Eric Idle, Dan Aykroyd, Mel Gibson, and Rodney Dangerfield.

One Rotten Tomatoes critic wrote that “Casper” was based on the original cartoon and comic book, “Casper the Friendly Ghost”. The movie is a terrific mix of live action and the superb wizardry of Steven Spielberg’s Amblin Entertainment and George Lucas’s Industrial Light & Magic.”

KENNEWICK/YAKIMA—The American Red Cross urges donors to give blood or platelets now to help curb a drop in donor turnout this fall. Donors of all blood types and those giving platelets are asked to book a donation time at a Red Cross blood donation center or community blood drive to help hospitals get the tools they need to care for patients ahead of the holidays.

As a thank-you, the Red Cross will give donors from Oct 27 through Nov 16, 2025, \$20 gift cards and a chance to win one of three \$5,000 prizes. See RedCrossBlood.org/harvest for more information.

November is National Diabetes Awareness Month. Understanding our health is the foundation for helping prevent chronic illness. Blood and platelet donations can be a part of that journey. The Red Cross will offer donors free A1C testing in November, a test commonly used to screen for prediabetes and diabetes. (One test result in 12 months; do not fast before donating).

To find and book an appointment for a blood donation drive in your area, go to RedCrossBlood.org and enter your zip code in the red “Find a Blood Drive” box in the upper right corner on the homepage.

Locations include multiple drives in Milton-Freewater, Pendleton, Walla Walla, Waitsburg, and Dayton.

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card, a driver’s license, or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states or 16 with parental consent, where allowed by state law, who weigh at least 110 pounds, and who are generally in good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger must also meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time on the day of their donation by using RapidPass to complete a pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/rapidpass or use the Blood Donor App.

SUPPORT OF THE WAITSBURG POOL LEVY

To the Editor,

I am voting YES to approve the Waitsburg Parks and Recreation District (WPR) levy on Nov. 4. As a parent, community member, and WPR commissioner, there are many reasons why I support a new pool in Waitsburg.

Camaraderie. For 100 years, Waitsburg had a swimming pool. It was a gathering place for family and friends. Kids rode their bikes to the pool, for lessons, to meet friends, to play, and to beat the heat. They picked up snacks and drinks at the grocery store on the way. Families had BBQs and cooled off in the pool. Adult swim times allowed parents an opportunity to connect with friends, kid-free. For the past six years, these memories have not been made, and it’s clear that the pool has been greatly missed.

Safety. As reported by The American Academy of Pediatrics, drowning is the most common cause of death for children ages 1-4, and one of the leading causes of teen deaths. The swimming lesson schedules offered in other communities do not work for most working parents in Waitsburg.

Health. This pool is designed to meet the needs of all generations. It will not only provide opportunities for young people to exercise and play, but it will also offer options to meet the needs of our adult and senior populations. In addition to the six lanes dedicated to lap swimming and cardiovascular exercise, it also meets the needs of exercise enthusiasts or people in need of injury rehabilitation. Water-based fitness classes, like aerobics, yoga, cycling, or walking, provide safe resistance workouts.

Competition. Our valley has a number of young people who are actively competing in swimming. A local pool will make training sessions more accessible for those families.

Economy. The addition of a new state-of-the-art swimming pool will attract visitors to our community. Those visitors will not only financially benefit the pool, but they will also contribute to our other businesses. They will eat at our restaurants, shop in our stores, and fill their gas tanks while visiting Waitsburg. Their dollars spent while visiting are good for our business owners and our community.

Commitment. The community was surveyed, and both times the results were obvious, Waitsburg wants a pool. Many hard-working volunteers have raised about \$95,000. They have worked with the engineering company & FEMA to follow regulations, select a site, and a design that is tailored for Waitsburg.

Grants. To qualify for local, state, and federal grants, the team must be able to show the community is committed. Passing the levy will allow us to obtain the additional funding we need to complete the pool project.

The Preston-Parton Milling Co. are thinking of putting in a small electric plant for lighting their mill.

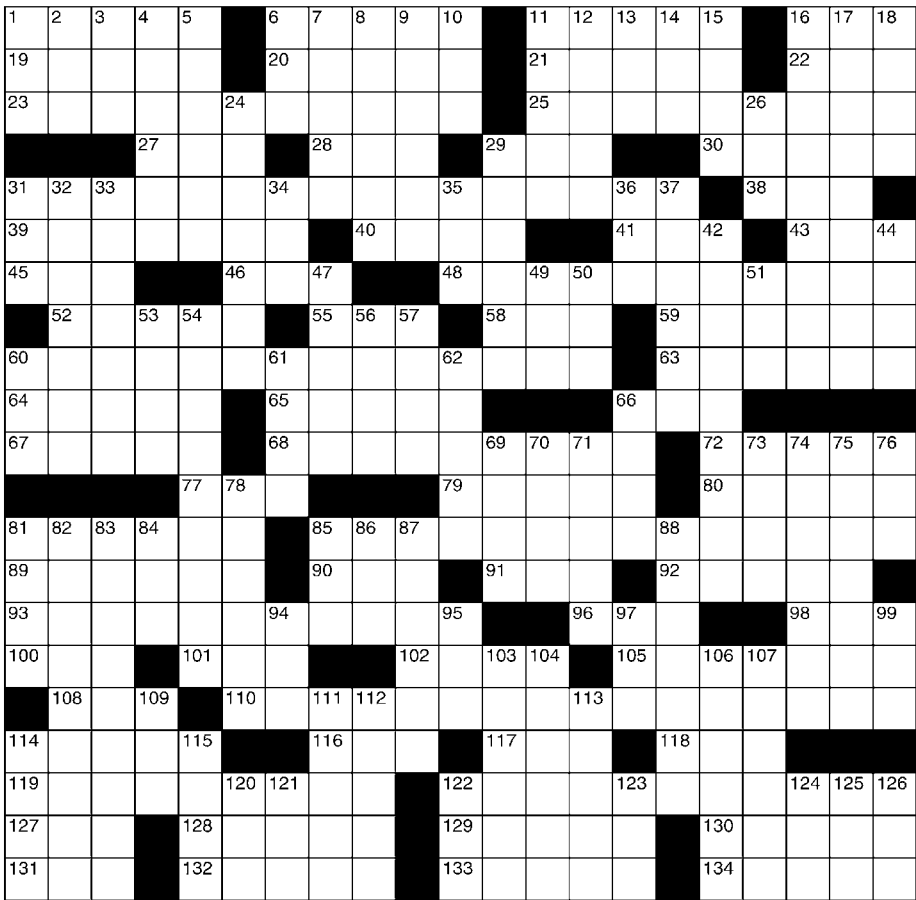
L.T. Parker has leased the streetcar lines in Walla Walla. His son James is operator. And now no doubt, Tom will soon be a millionaire several times over.

MY RECIPES

Beef & Pumpkin Enchiladas

Autumn is my favorite time of year for celebrations centered around food. High on the list is the colorful and distinctly Mexican tradition of Día de los Muertos. In our house, the mantle is turned into an ofrenda with photos of departed family members, marigolds, and candles. On the night of November 1st, I prepare a feast to be enjoyed by the living and shared with the spirits of the dead. These spiced beef enchiladas embrace the season with roasted pumpkin and a rich, deeply flavored homemade sauce.



Ingredients:

- For the sauce:**
8 dried ancho chiles
4 dried pasilla or guajillo chiles
1 medium white onion, quartered
2 plum tomatoes
3 cloves garlic
½ teaspoon dried oregano, Mexican preferred
½ teaspoon dried marjoram
2 tablespoons canola oil
1 tablespoon honey or agave syrup
Salt to taste

For the filling:

- 1 pound pumpkin, peeled and ½ -diced
2 teaspoons cumin, plus 1 teaspoon
1 teaspoon ground red chili, cayenne, or chipotle
1 teaspoon kosher salt
Canola oil
½ white onion, finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 pound ground beef
1 teaspoon dried oregano
10 to 12 corn tortillas
½ cup queso fresco, crumbled or sharp cheddar

Directions:

Make the sauce: Seed and stem the dried chiles. In a hot dry cast iron skillet, toast the chiles until fragrant, about 15 seconds per side. Remove from pan and set in a large pot. Next, char the onion, whole tomatoes, and garlic cloves in the hot skillet. Take your time to develop some dark char marks. Remove from the pan and add to the pot with the chiles. Add just enough water to almost cover the chiles and vegetables. Stir in the oregano and marjoram then bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat to maintain a simmer, and cook for 15 minutes, uncovered.

Add the softened vegetables and chiles to blender jar with the cooking water. Carefully, blend on low for a minute until smooth. Remember to open vent when blending hot liquids. Blend in two batches if needed. Strain mixture through a fine mesh strainer over a bowl. Use a rubber spatula to push all the liquid through.

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in large pot over medium-high. Pour strained liquid into pot and "fry the sauce." Reduce the heat and simmer for 30 to 45 minutes, uncovered, until sauce has thickened. Then, add honey or agave syrup, and season to taste with salt. Take off the heat and allow sauce to rest for at least 1 hour. Sauce can be made a day ahead of time and stored in the fridge until ready to use.

Make filling: Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a large bowl toss the pumpkin, 2 teaspoons cumin, ground chili, 1 teaspoon kosher salt (or ½ teaspoon fine salt), with about 2 tablespoons of oil. Spread on a foil lined baking sheet and set in middle rack of oven. Roast for 15 minutes, stir, and then bake for an additional 10 to 15 minutes, until pumpkin is tender. Let cool slightly on baking sheet.

In a skillet, heat a tablespoon of oil over medium heat. Add the chopped onion with a pinch of salt. Sauté until soft, 5 to 10 minutes. Add the garlic, sautéing for another minute, then add the beef, 1 teaspoon cumin, and oregano. Continue to cook, browning and crumbling the beef. Reduce heat to low, add the roasted pumpkin and 3 tablespoons of the enchilada sauce. Gently mix to combine. Don't mash the pumpkin. Taste and adjust seasoning, adding more salt as needed. Take off heat and set aside.

In a skillet, heat a couple tablespoons of oil over medium-high heat. When the oil is shimmering, quickly fry tortillas, one at a time, until just soft (not crispy), about 5 seconds per side. Use tongs to gently remove tortillas from oil without ripping, and stack on a plate lined with paper towels.

Assemble enchiladas: Pour a thin layer of the enchilada sauce in the bottom of a 9 by 13-inch baking dish. Place a tortilla on work surface and spoon a few heaping tablespoons of filling in a row down middle of tortilla. Carefully, roll from the side closest to you, tightly packing the filling to make a rolled enchilada. Place seam side down in the pan and repeat with remaining tortillas. When pan is full, pour more enchilada sauce over the tops and sides. Sauce should come up about halfway up the sides of enchiladas. You will not use all the sauce. Top with the crumbled queso fresco. Bake in 375-degree oven for 15 to 25 minutes until sauce is bubbling and cheese is lightly browned.

Notes: Of course, in a pinch you can use your favorite canned red enchilada sauce. However, this sauce recipe is easy and deeply flavorful. Leftover sauce can be used for chilaquiles, an enhancement to soup bases, or just a lovely chili sauce for roasted vegetables or meats. Enjoy!

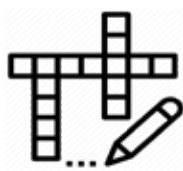
