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National blood shortage: Donate now

KENNEWICK — For only the second time in history, the American Red Cross has declared a national blood crisis. Patients may already be feeling the impact, and donations are urgently needed to save lives.

Summer blood donations are at a four-year low, worsening this season's blood shortage. All blood types are needed; however, the situation is especially dire for type O blood. The supply of type O positive blood has dropped below a one-day supply. The Red Cross must limit the distribution of these blood products to hospitals.

Now is the time to book a blood donation appointment by visiting [RedCrossBlood.org](https://www.redcrossblood.org), calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767), or using the Red Cross blood donation app.

To encourage donations, the Red Cross will email Fandango movie tickets to donors who give by July 31. Additionally, all type O blood donors will receive a bonus \$20 e-gift card.

Donors who give blood between August 1 and 31, 2026, will receive a \$20 Amazon Gift Card by email.

Despite thousands of people stepping up since the emergency blood shortage was declared earlier this month, donations have not kept pace with hospital demand. Extreme heat, poor air quality, and widespread foodborne illnesses have contributed to lower donor turnout this summer.

"This summer has brought a number of unique challenges that have placed additional strain on our blood supply, creating growing concerns for hospitals and the patients who rely on life-saving transfusions," said Paul Sullivan, senior vice president of donor services for the Red Cross. CCHS EARNS PATIENT SAFETY ACCREDITATION

DAYTON — Columbia County Health System and Dayton General Hospital have earned accreditation from Det Norske Veritas (DNV) through its National Integrated Accreditation for Healthcare Organizations (NIAHO) Critical Access Hospital Accreditation Program.

The accreditation verifies that Dayton General Hospital has satisfied the patient safety standards, known as the Conditions of Participation, set forth by the U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. DNV's accreditation program also integrates the ISO 9001 standard for quality management systems. The hos-

pital will have three years from this accreditation to achieve compliance with the international QMS standard.

For Columbia County Health System, the recognition reflects the ongoing work of staff across the organization to review processes, strengthen systems, improve communication, and support safe, reliable care for patients close to home.

"Quality and patient safety are part of the work we do every day," said Amy Crickmer, PhD, RN, Director of Quality Improvement at Columbia County Health System. "This accreditation reflects the commitment of our entire team and gives us another strong framework to continue improving the care we provide to our community."

Double meteor showers peak this week

WAITSBURG — The Southern Delta Aquariids and Alpha Capricornids meteor showers will overlap between July 28 and 31, 2026.

The two showers will peak this week, occurring back-to-back between July 28 and 31.

The Southern Delta Aquariids shower will arrive first, with the highest activity between July 28 and 30. At its strongest, there should be about 15 meteors an hour. They are not particularly bright, and appear to radiate from the area of Alpha Capricorni, a double star visible to the naked eye. The meteors are the result of debris left behind by comet 96/Machholz, which orbits the Sun every 5.27 years.

The Alpha Capricornids are a long-running shower from July 3 to August 15. Their strongest activity will coincide with the Aquariids beginning July 30 and 31. The meteors rise around 10 p.m., and are highest in the sky by 3 a.m. Their meteors originate from comet 169P/NEAT, which orbits the Sun every 4.2 years. The showers are less productive than the Aquariids, with around five meteors an hour at peak, but are brighter, faster, and more visible. They also throw off particularly visible fireballs. This shower can be seen from both hemispheres and radiates west of the star known as Delta Aquarii. This would be about 40 degrees east of the Alpha Capricornids shower.

Viewing these showers does not require binoculars or telescopes, since both narrow the field of vision and can work against the viewer. For best viewing, let your eyes adjust to the dark for 30 minutes, lie on your back, and scan a wide area of the sky.

The showers should be visible starting after midnight; the best time is between 2 a.m. and 5 a.m., from July 28 to July 31.

There are several mobile apps that can help plan, track, and view meteor showers. On Apple, there are Sky Guide, Sky Tonight, Night Sky 11, and Meteor Active.

On Android and Apple, there are Sky Safari 7, Stellarium Mobile, and Sky Walk 2.

The PhotoPills app is designed to help photographers plan, calculate exposures, depth of field, and other information to ensure successful photos of or influenced by space.

“The Odyssey”

DAYTON — Christopher Nolan’s “The Odyssey” is his adaptation of Homer’s ancient Greek epic poem. It was filmed using new IMAX film technology. The movie follows the mythic Greek hero Odysseus on his perilous ten-year journey home after the Trojan War. He and his soldiers encounter gods, monsters, and treacherous seas while his wife and son face turmoil in Ithaca. The cast includes Matt Damon, Tom Holland, Lupita Nyong’o, Zendaya, Charlize Theron, and Robert Pattinson. It is rated R for violence and some language, with a runtime of 172 minutes.

The Rotten Tomatoes audience and critics agree “The Odyssey” is epic, giving it an average rating of over 95%. A consensus from the critics said, “The movie reinvigorates an ancient adventure with majestic sweep and sterling work by its colossal ensemble; Christopher Nolan’s ‘The Odyssey’ imbues myth with primal human feeling.”

The Odyssey is visually stunning, primarily using analog, in-camera effects that give the Sacking of Troy and mythical encounters a tangible, gritty weight. The water-drenched actors were tossed about on boats, ran from crumbling sets, piled inside the Trojan horse, and escaped a terrifyingly human cyclops. A movie like this does not come around often. It has created controversy, acclaim, and interest in the classic myth.

Patrick E. Mohnney, 72, passed away peacefully at his home in Waitsburg, Washington, on June 25, 2026, just after sunrise.

Born on October 9, 1953, Pat lived a life defined by strength, grit, and an enduring love for the outdoors. He believed in hard work, valued honesty, loyalty, and family, and found his greatest joy beneath the open skies and in the mountains he called home.

A gifted athlete, Pat was a standout football player whose talent and determination earned him the opportunity to play for Whitman College. The toughness, discipline, and quiet confidence he displayed on the football field remained hallmarks of his character throughout his life.

At heart, Pat was a cowboy. In his younger years, he could often be found on horseback in the mountains, hunting, hauling salt for wildlife, or herding cattle across the rugged country he knew so well. He embraced a life of self-reliance and adventure, finding peace in the saddle and purpose in caring for the land and its wildlife.

Pat’s love of the outdoors never faded. He was an avid hunter who treasured time spent in the mountains, looked forward to fishing trips to Alaska, and in later years, enjoyed exploring the backcountry in his UTV. Whether chasing elk, casting a line in Alaska, or discovering a new mountain trail, Pat felt most at home surrounded by nature.

Pat was a man who believed that honest work was something to be proud of. Throughout his life, he worked as a farmer, a truck driver, and a grader operator for the Walla Walla County Road Department. He retired from the Road Department after years of dedicated service, earning the respect of his coworkers through his strong work ethic and dependability.

More importantly, Pat was the kind of man who never hesitated to help someone in need. Whether it meant cutting down trees, building a shop, fixing equipment, or simply lending a hand, if you asked for help, Pat was there. He gave freely of his time and talents, never expecting recognition in return. His generosity, quiet humility, and willingness to serve others are among the qualities that will be remembered most.

Those who knew Pat will remember his steady character, his quiet sense of humor, and his generous heart. To many, he was more than a friend or neighbor- he was “Uncle Pat” or simply “Grandpa,” titles he cher-

Pat’s legacy lives on in every mountain trail he explored, every hunting camp shared with loved ones, every fishing story from Alaska, every road he helped build, and every life he touched through his kindness and generosity. He leaves behind an example of what it means to work hard, love deeply, help freely, and live with quiet integrity. He will be deeply missed and forever remembered by all who had the privilege of knowing him.

Warren Talbot, lifelong Dayton area farmer, passed away Friday, July 17, 2026 at the Rivers Walk Assisted Living in Dayton. He was 88.

He was born Walter Warren Talbot in Dayton on October 27, 1937, to Paul and Amelia Warren Talbott. He grew up in Dayton along with his big sister Sally. Warren graduated from Dayton High School in 1956, attended Washington State University for one year before earning his bachelor’s in animal husbandry from Cal-Poly, San Luis Obispo. He was very involved in livestock judging and showing market steers through 4-H, FFA and even at college. He attended Cal-Poly along with his sister Sally and made many lifelong relationships there and was very involved in their alumni program long after graduating.

He served six years in the Air National Guard, after the Korean War and before the Vietnam War. Returning to Dayton, he farmed north of town on the Whetstone, raising cattle and growing cereal grains. He later grew the farm to include land they called the Willow Creek place. Warren was a good farmer and enjoyed working the land. He retired from that around 2002.

Warren was instrumental in the development of the Bluewood Ski area and was one of the original investors in making the ski hill a reality. For over 20 years; he taught ski lessons there. He also spent time in Palm Springs off and on between farming seasons. Forever a car enthusiast; Warren enjoyed finer sports cars and always had a Corvette over the years among others. He loved racehorses too and he helped start pari-mutual betting of horse racing years ago at Dayton Days.

He enjoyed spending time with his family and would often drive his parents to Enterprise, Oregon for family gatherings at his sister’s ranch. Holidays with Sally’s family were always a good time and he was the best Easter egg hider his niece’s and nephew ever had. Graduating with one of the largest classes to come from Dayton High School; Warren usually helped plan the class reunions and just missed his 70th by his passing.

He wanted to see his community prosper and thrive; but always had an eye for its history as well. He was instrumental in the preservation and restoration of the Dayton Depot and helped emphasize the importance and need for the courthouse remodel project. His philanthropy, enthusiasm and support for these projects and many others will be felt by the community for years to come.

Warren is survived by his two nieces; Patty Barnett of Lewiston, Idaho and Jill Moncrief of Enterprise, Oregon, his trusted confidant Casey Colley and his family of Palm Springs California. He was preceded in death by his parents, his sister, Sally Mackin and a nephew John Mackin.

A special thanks to Jim Dee and all the wonderful staff at Rivers Walk Assisted Living in Dayton that took such good care of Warren.

Warren was laid to rest in the family plot with his parents and sister in the Waitsburg Cemetery. A Celebration of Life will be planned at a later date after harvest.

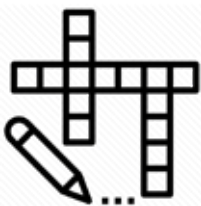
