Suspect charged in Spokane Complex Fires

SPOKANE — Aaron F. Farinacci, of Spokane, Washington, was arrested Monday, August 3, 2026. He has been charged with first-degree arson in connection with the Old Trails fire, the largest of three wildfires in the region, and held on a \$1 million bond, according to the Spokane County Sheriff’s Office.

Spokane County Sheriff John Nowels said a witness driving near the area where the Old Trail Fire is believed to have started, reported seeing a man “bending down” near the grass and standing up, looking “very nervous.” The witness had contacted police after seeing smoke rise from the same area.

Farinacci was found with waterproof matches and a butane lighter when he was arrested. The fire, first reported on Saturday afternoon, had burned over 700 structures with around 65,000 people under evacuation orders by Monday.

The three fires, Autumn Lane, Fairview, and Old Trail, are located northwest of Spokane and remained 0% contained as of Tuesday, August 4. The origins of the Autumn and Fairview fires are not known at this time.

The Pacific Northwest has been in a drought since May. Washington State Gov. Bob Ferguson declared a statewide state of emergency on Saturday due to the drought, high temperatures, and high winds. Fire weather conditions have improved slightly, allowing firefighters to make progress since the weekend’s high winds. A heat advisory remains in effect for much of the Columbia River Basin, further drying the terrain.

Smoke in the Pacific Northwest continues to be a problem with air quality alerts posted for Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. On Tuesday, most of Eastern Washington had Air Quality Index alerts of 150, categorized as unhealthy.

Imagination Library secures funding to restore state-wide access

OLYMPIA —The Imagination Library of Washington (ILWA) has been awarded two grants to help restore Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library. The library provides free, high-quality, age-appropriate books each month to children from birth to age five in Washington.

The financial commitments from the Roots & Wings Foundation and the John and Tami Marick Family Foundation will stabilize ILWA’s 50% book-cost match, which supports local program partners, and restore service in paused communities as quickly as possible. Together, these commitments provide critical immediate support while creating a stronger foundation for statewide program stability.

The combined support could restore access to approximately 40,000 children and return the Imagination Library to full statewide coverage. Once the program is restored the total statewide enrollment is expected to exceed 100,000 children.

Roots & Wings committed \$3 million to ILWA to support book funding and the program over the next two years. This fiscal year, a significant tiered contribution from The JTMF Foundation will also help to support the 50% book-cost match, helping local program partners maintain existing service and restore service in paused communities.

“This extraordinary support will help thousands of Washington children once again receive a new book in the mail each month,” said Brooke Fisher-Clark, Executive Director of Imagination Library of Washington. “We are deeply grateful to Roots & Wings Foundation and The JTMF Foundation for helping restore service and stabilize the book-cost match our local partners depend on. Their investments provide critical stability now, but renewed public funding remains vital to sustaining statewide access for Washington children over the long term.”

ILWA previously achieved statewide coverage across all 39 counties through a network of local program partners. Unlike prior years, ILWA was not included in this year’s state operating budget, which provided a 50% share in the cost of books. At the same time, several local program partners faced challenges securing their share of the book match.

Public and private investment remains essential to protecting statewide access in future years. Imagination Library of Washington encourages Washington residents to participate by sharing enrollment and program information, advocating for continued state investment during the 2027 legislative session, and contributing to the program’s sustainability.

Imagination Library of Washington works in partnership with Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library and a statewide network of local program partners to provide free, high-quality, age-appropriate books each month to Washington children from birth to age five. By helping families build home libraries and establish regular reading routines, the program promotes early literacy and helps prepare children for success when they enter school. www.imaginationlibrarywashington.org.

“The Odyssey” & “Aladdin”

DAYTON — Christopher Nolan’s “The Odyssey” is his adaptation of Homer’s ancient Greek epic poem. It was filmed using new IMAX film technology. The movie follows the mythic Greek hero Odysseus on his perilous ten-year journey home after the Trojan War. He and his soldiers encounter gods, monsters, and treacherous seas while his wife and son face turmoil in Ithaca. The cast includes Matt Damon, Tom Holland, Lupita Nyong’o, Zendaya, Charlize Theron, and Robert Pattinson. It is rated R for violence and some language, with a runtime of 172 minutes.

The Rotten Tomatoes audience and critics agree “The Odyssey” is epic, giving it an average rating of over 95%. A consensus from the critics said, “The movie reinvigorates an ancient adventure with majestic sweep and sterling work by its colossal ensemble; Christopher Nolan’s ‘The Odyssey’ imbues myth with primal human feeling.”

The Odyssey is visually stunning, primarily using analog, in-camera effects that give the Sacking of Troy and mythical encounters a tangible, gritty weight. The water-drenched actors were tossed about on boats, ran from crumbling sets, piled inside the Trojan horse, and escaped a terrifyingly human cyclops. A movie like this does not come around often. It has created controversy, acclaim, and interest in the classic myth.

“Aladdin,” The Missoula Children’s Theatre’s 2026 live production, will be performed on Friday, August 7, at 7 p.m. and Saturday, August 8, at 3 p.m.

Mark your calendar to see The Liberty Theater make its screen debut in “The Last Picture Shows” on September 10, 2026. The film by Rustin Thompson follows his search into the American West for traces of a vanishing small-town centerpiece – the movie theater. It is a portrait of an industry in crisis as it faces consolidation and streaming. The movie a reminder that even in cinema deserts, there are still local movie houses that offer entertainment and community connection, including The Liberty Theater.

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HISTORIC MILITARY VEHICLE CONVOY WILL ROLL THROUGH DAYTON, WAITSBURG, WALLA WALLA ON MONDAY

TOUCHET VALLEY — A column of up to 100 vintage military vehicles is traveling along the 2,100 miles of the Lewis and Clark Corps of Discovery westward route from Mandan, North Dakota to Fort Stevens, Oregon. The convoy is organized by the Military Vehicle Preservation Association, a nonprofit to support military vehicle enthusiasts, historians, educators, and collectors.

Following the original path as closely as possible, the group travels an average of 150 miles a day, at 35 mph. Vehicles range from WWII jeeps to late model 5 ton trucks.

On Monday, August, 10, the convoy will be stopping in Dayton, Waitsburg, and Walla Walla. First, the group will be at the Columbia County Courthouse around 11 a.m., Patit Creek Campsite around 1:30 p.m., and then on to Waitsburg’s Main Street around 2 p.m. The convoy will end the day in Walla Walla.

Waterfall trolley - Kayaking the Snake

Adventures await. Two Saturdays – two adventures. One to the west – one to the east. Luckily, the weather was ideal for both outings.

The first Saturday destination was about four hours to the west, to Ainsworth State Park in Oregon. The park is the only overnight campground along the waterfall corridor on the Historic Columbia River Highway, where we planned to board the Waterfall Trolley.

The Waterfall Trolley hop-on-hop-off tour includes up to six waterfalls and a stop at Vista House. We purchased tickets online prior to traveling to Ainsworth and hopped on the open-air trolley early Saturday morning. Sisters Sandra, Janet, and Joanie, brother-in-law Scott, Allen, and I rode the trolley west to our first stop at Vista House.

On the trolley, the driver narrated the sights, with stories about the waterfalls, highway, and the Columbia River Gorge. The tickets allowed us to hop off and reboard at convenient stops along the world-famous waterfall corridor without a timed entry permit or having to find parking.

Four of the falls- Latourell Falls, Wahkeena Falls, Multnomah Falls, and Horsetail Falls- were short hikes from the trolley stops and enjoyed by all.

Two of the falls, Bridal Veil and Ponytail, required longer hikes. Ponytail Falls was a unique experience for its

views and the geologic formation that runs behind the falls. The trail was rated an easy one-mile round trip with a 200+ foot elevation gain and views of the Columbia River. I don’t know about “easy”. It felt more like a 400+ feet gain, but we made it.

The Waterfall Trolley was an enjoyable way to see waterfalls along the Historic Columbia River Highway. It was well worth the \$39 ticket price.

Our second Saturday destination was east to Asotin, Washington. Sisters Sandra, Janet, Joanie, cousin Sandy from Pullman, friend Tammye from Dayton, and I planned to kayak from Asotin to Clarkston.

We were a little leery of possible smoke in the area or high winds on the river, but both were minimal for our journey down the river.

It was a busy day on the river with boats and skidoos zooming by us. The boats made for an interesting day, as they made waves to navigate. We felt fairly safe as the boat patrol was on duty and officers stopped us to make sure we all had life vests and whistles.

Tammye’s husband Rick and Allen were ready to load kayaks when we reached our get-out point. We did not travel down the river as far as we did a few years ago but it was a nice day to enjoy the view, soak up the rays and relish the peace on the river.

There is still plenty of summer left to experience destinations close to home. Adventure awaits.

Palouse Outdoors: Fins Under Fire

An orange haze hung over the meadow to the southwest. Another smoke plume billowed behind rugged peaks to the east. A red-bellied McDonnell Douglas MD-87 air tanker lumbered out of the smoke. It looked like any passenger jet, with windows and two engines near the tail, except this jet's cargo capacity was 3,000 gallons of water or fire retardant. Just one of many planes executing a full aerial assault on the nearby fires.

The jet engines roared overhead, and to the east, one or two every five minutes. I stood like a lone tree in the grassy meadow, fly-fishing rod in one hand and a Nikon DSLR with a 500-millimeter zoom lens in the other. I'd fished this mountain meadow many times, but this experience was unique.

The creek meandering into the forested canyon held brook trout of all sizes. The water was narrow, shallow, and warmer than usual, yet the fish were no less feisty. Orange-and-black California tortoiseshell butterflies fluttered among white and purple wildflowers. Sand-colored grasshoppers crawled across the shrub-steppe landscape. Everything but the grasses and sage conformed to a wildfire color palette, so I chose a pink, sand, and gray foam-bodied hopper with rubber legs.

The fly plopped heavily into the calm waters of a deep bend in the creek, having barely slipped in between the overhanging grasses. Ripples spread from the point of impact, followed by the splash of a fish erupting on the fly. Picking up the 13-foot tenkara rod, I set the hook perfectly, then transported the fish from the aquatic realm to the terrestrial. I thought it fitting that the brook trout's fiery orange belly matched the wildfire smoke haze, the flames, and the belly of the air tankers.

Another tanker approached as if on cue – a British Aerospace 146 that appeared to be bleeding pink fire retardant. It was smaller and stouter than the MD-87, propelled by four wing-mounted engines, yet it carried the same 3,000-gallon fuselage capacity. It passed overhead, offering a close look at the plane's unique payload modifications.

"Can heavy smoke starve a jet engine of oxygen?" I wondered, though I knew the answer was "yes." Fortunately, professional pilots know better than to enter a smoke screen that dense.

Returning to the brook trout, I marveled at its beautiful pink and blue speckling, which contrasted with its deep olive dorsal coloration and vermiculation. Fall spawning is the only time you'll see one more dapper. I cut my fly-fishing teeth on Appalachian brook trout and struggle to kill them. But upon reminding myself that they're tasty invasive species in the western U.S., I thumped its head and bagged it for roasting over the campfire in a puddle of salted butter.

Camp had been fogged in by smoke from heavy winds pushing up from the southwest. Packing up and evacuating before nightfall crossed my mind, but the U.S. Forest Service's daily check-ins brought reassurance. There were four ways out of camp, which at least gave the illusion of safety and helped push the concern out of mind.

Kneeling in the creek behind camp, I slid a knife from the fish's vent to its gills, then cut down behind the head and pulled out the unwanted bits, tossing them far into the stream's current. The fish cleaned up nicely in the cold mountain water, their orange muscle as stunning as their painted skin. I laid them on aluminum foil with a couple of tablespoons of butter, folded them up, and set them over the small flames of a pine-twig fire.

Golden and purple potatoes from the garden boiled on the camper stove as I sipped a dark, rich stout by the fire. The butter crackled in the foil packets while another plane droned overhead. Not a jet this time. It was a Canadair CL-415 Super Scooper that fills its belly by skimming the surface of a lake or large river. Its boxy design, amber paint job, and "FIRE" painted in red beneath the wings were a dead giveaway. A second soon followed as they circled above the trees from north to east, preparing to drop their 1,600-gallon payloads.

Halfway through my stout, I pulled the fish from the fire and checked the potatoes. They were perfectly soft for mashing into a creamy texture with butter, salt, and pepper. The delicious aroma of wild trout and warm butter rose from the foil packets as I carefully pried them open. Lifting the fish by the tip of the spine, I slid the fork along the underside of the spine to cleanly separate the meat from the bone, then flipped the fish and repeated the process. There's no

simpler way to debone fish. In my humble (but experienced) opinion, there's no better-tasting fish than wild mountain brook trout. No seasoning required. Slightly sweet, mild, and firm, it pairs perfectly with buttered potatoes.

Allison Krauss and Union Station ended the day as I sipped a nightcap of pecan praline whiskey, the creek's background rush sounding like applause. When the glass was empty, I crunched through the gravel toward the camper and climbed the stairs to

the bed that would sleep far better than anything pitched in a tent.

The roar of a jet engine grew closer as eyelids grew heavier. Poignant dreams came to life as the jet passed, its roar fading. Wildfire flames licked over the ridge as the fly rod bent under the weight of another brook trout. There was no fear or urgency—only the carefree sense of the wilderness and the acrid aroma of wildfire. Tomorrow would be another day of chasing fins under fire.



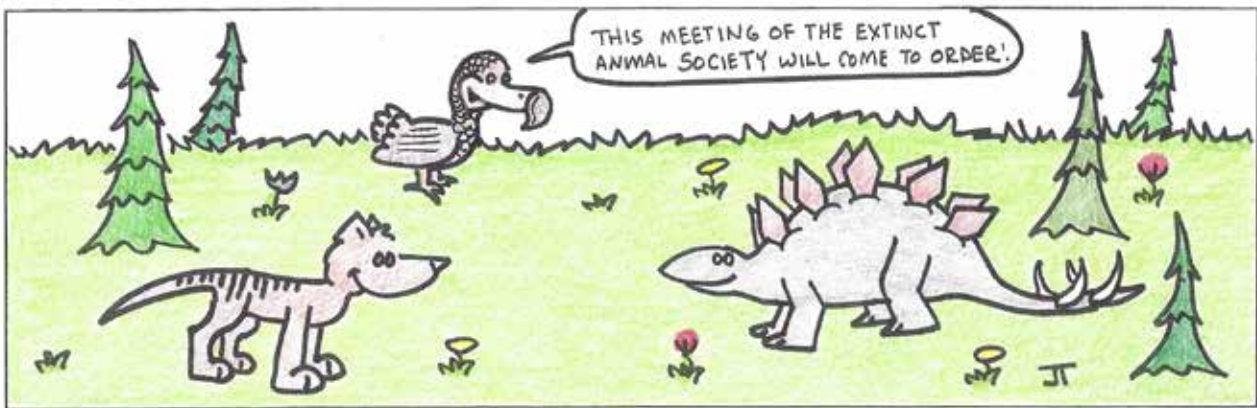

Zucchini Gratin

Each summer-growing season in the garden is a little different from the last. Things that thrive one year can struggle to flourish the next. Despite all the surprises and unpredictability, the one thing that there is never a shortage of is zucchini. This most prolific of summer squash needs to be harvested daily, and even after giving away boxes to friends and family we seem to always have a fresh pile on the kitchen counter. As a result, I have researched and tested countless recipes that use this versatile vegetable in imaginative ways. Here, tender zucchini is gratineed with a crispy breadcrumb and cheese topping to make a delightful side dish for summer entertaining.

Ingredients:

- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter, plus more
- 1 pound yellow onions, cut in half lengthwise and sliced
- 2 pounds zucchini, sliced ¼-inch rounds or half moons
- 1 tablespoon fresh thyme (or 1 teaspoon dried)
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt (or 1 teaspoon fine salt)
- 1 teaspoon fresh ground black pepper
- ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 cup whole milk
- ¾ cup plain panko breadcrumbs
- ¾ cup grated parmesan or Gruyere
- Pinch sweet paprika

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees.

Melt the butter in a large 12-inch skillet or Dutch-oven over low heat. Add the onions and cook until tender but not browned, about 15 to 20 minutes. Add the zucchini and cook, covered for 10 minutes, until tender.

Meanwhile, pour the milk into a small saucepan and bring to just below a simmer then take off the heat and set aside. Uncover the zucchini and raise the heat to medium, then add the thyme, salt, pepper, and nutmeg, sautéing for another 5 minutes. Sprinkle the flour over the top of the zucchini then stir to evenly combine. Next, add the hot milk to the skillet and continue to cook over medium to medium-low heat for a few minutes to thicken the sauce. Taste and adjust the seasoning, adding more salt if needed. Pour the mixture into an 8 by 10-inch baking dish, spreading across the bottom.

In a small bowl, combine the breadcrumbs and grated cheese. Spread breadcrumb mixture over the top of zucchini and dot the top with another tablespoon of butter cut into small pieces. Sprinkle a little paprika over the top for color. Place on middle rack of hot oven and bake until bubbly and golden brown, about 20 minutes.

Notes:

You could make this gratin with a mixture of summer squash such as crook necks along with the zucchini. Other fresh herbs, such as basil, rosemary, or parsley, could be mixed into the zucchini before topping with the breadcrumbs. You could also add a little chopped garlic at the same time as the herbs.

Creamy without being heavy, this is an easy summer side dish that comes together quickly. Lovely served with grilled meats or roasted chicken. Enjoy!

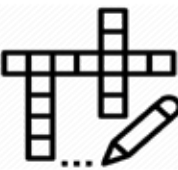

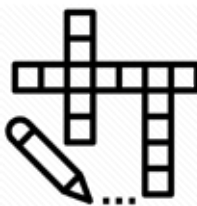
