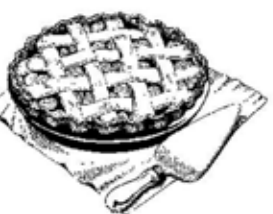

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## Restored press to be unveiled at Fall Festival

*Past publishers, historical society, and community saved a rare press.*

WAITSBURG — An essential part of Waitsburg's history will be reintroduced to the community at the Pioneer Fall Festival this Sunday by the Waitsburg Historical Society. The Miehle No. 3 flatbed press, used by the "The Times" for decades, has found a permanent home at the Wilson-Philips House in Waitsburg.

The press was first assembled in 1912 and later bought by Emerson Wheeler, who published "The Times" until he died in 1942. The paper used the flatbed press until December 1975, when publishers Tom and Anita Baker transitioned to offset printing. Instead of selling the press for scrap metal, Tom Baker chose to dismantle and store it with help from brothers Ron and Roger Miller.

Larry Broom, owner of Blue Mountain Insurance, offered to store the Miehle, which took four feet of floor space at his building on Main Street.

Tom Baker's widow, Anita, and his son, Loyal, helped complete the effort to save the historic press by working with the historical society to find it a permanent location. Due to the sale of Broom's building, the deconstructed press was

relocated to its new home in July 2020. Re-assembly began with the help of Ed Haight, Haight Brothers, Inc., Spokane.

Baker said that Haight, 82, made four two-day visits to Waitsburg since 2020; the last was in October 2023, when the press cylinder was set in place and adjusted to print properly. He is one of the few press mechanics remaining in the U.S. with direct knowledge of Miehle presses.

"Bruce Himko of Waitsburg has been that 'burst of energy' the project needed in the final months to get the last details wrapped up. He is a retired pressman and has been instrumental in the last phases of the Miehle, helping me with the tinker-toy puzzle of the Mentges folder," said Loyal Baker.

The Mentges newspaper folder used by "The Times" has also been reassembled and will be displayed with the press.

Several critical parts were lost during the 45 years the letterpress was in storage, and some were damaged during installation. Bob Gemmell of Gemmell's Machine Works, Inc. in Dayton fabricated and replaced parts and a company in New York state custom-made missing springs.

The historical society and restorers received technical assistance from the Printer's Hall at the Midwest Old Thresher Museum, in Iowa, and found replacements for missing parts from Triangle Printing, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

“Trap”

DAYTON—In the movie “Trap,” a father and his teen daughter attend a pop concert and realize they’re at the center of a dark and sinister event. This horror-thriller movie, directed and written by M. Night Shyamalan, follows a serial killer evading a police blockade while attending a concert with his daughter.

Rotten Tomatoes critics and audiences rated this movie at 57% and 65 %, respectively. A consensus of the website’s critics is “An arch thriller given some grounding by Josh Hartnett’s committed performance, Shyamalan’s “Trap” will ensnare those who appreciate its tongue-in-cheek style while the rest will be eager to wriggle out from it.”

This movie is rated PG-13 for some violent content and brief, strong language. The IMDb parent’s guide indicates that the categories of violence/gore and frightening/intense scenes are moderate. All other categories were either mild or none. Runtime is 105 minutes.

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### THE SEGRAVES FAMILY TO BE HONORED AS PIONEERS OF THE YEAR

WAITSBURG — This year, the Waitsburg Historical Society will honor the Segraves family as the Pioneers of the Year.

“The Waitsburg Historical Society chose the Segraves family to receive the “Pioneer of the Year” award because of their long history in the area. Their land was purchased in 1903 on Jasper Mountain, and the family spent a lot of time those first years logging the area to set up their home,” said Deanne Tipton.

John Henry Segraves was born on July 28, 1868, in Ashe County, North Carolina, and brought his bride to Washington to start a life and family.

In 1882, he traveled to the Waitsburg, Washington, area to find work. In 1903, he purchased the family property on Jasper Mountain from Rufus Gross. He returned to North Carolina to marry Lona Phipps on June 4, 1904. A week after their wedding, the newlyweds moved to Washington, where they lived for the remainder of their lives. They were the parents of four children born in Gross, Washington:

- Lillie Mae Segraves born February 15, 1906
- Robert Lewin Segraves born April 3, 1909
- Elmer William Segraves born October 21, 1911
- Luella Lee Segraves born December 7, 1914

“John Henry and Lona Segraves and their children are the reason why we are here today: to honor our heritage,” said members of the Segrave family.

WAITSBURG — Waitsburg High School’s football team suffered a loss in their first game of the season at Desales on Thursday, September 5.

A moment of silence was held before the kickoff to remember Sean Sollars. The three-sport Desales alumni passed away in a car accident on August 31, 2024. Sollars’ #4 jersey was presented and then displayed during the game.

The Cardinals got on the scoreboard midway through the first quarter after quarterback Isa Reyes connected with Jayton Gleason for an 86-yard gain. Gleason was tackled on the one-yard line, and Reyes ran the ball for the touchdown in the next play. Brenton Segraves ran the ball in for a 2-point conversion. The Cardinals failed to score for the remainder of the game and lost 64-8.

Segraves led rushers with 35 total yards, and Lucas VanHoose picked up 65 yards on kickoff returns.

Coach Kiefel said his team struggled on offense and defense.

“Desales is solid and has a talented line,” said Kiefel. “My hat is off to coach Josh Richards, and I wish them luck on their season. My hope is that our guys can learn from this challenge and continue to make improvements.”

Charge, recharge, or no charge

Last spring, when Daniel was working as a private chef in Europe, I defied his command and purchased a new lawn mower. I went with a battery-operated model, then gave away our smelly, hard-to-pull-start gas mower. Along with the mower, I was sucked into the “package deal,” which included a weed whacker, and an extra battery for the mower, fortuitously a stroke of luck. For some unknown reason, one of the batteries was faulty, and it died. Or so I thought.

My maintenance philosophy drives Daniel crazy. That is because I’m done after the second try, sometimes the first, to fix something. It is time to move on and replace the defective or broken item and replace it with a new one. Daniel, on the other hand, relentlessly tries to fix everything repeatedly. He swears that I’d buy a new car if I got a flat tire. Maybe not a new car, but new mower batteries, for sure.

This whole battery dilemma (drama) started a few weeks ago when I noticed Daniel had stuck a stripe of blue painter’s tape with the word “broken” across one of the batteries. He told me to leave it alone and that he would check it out and fix the problem on his day off. According to his YouTube research, if a battery is drained completely, the charger won’t recognize it to recharge. All that occurs is a red light on the charger.

The YouTube solution to recharge a dead battery by connecting it to a live battery so the charger can find it to charge seemed to work.

I was impressed with his dedication to fixing the battery, and he began



mowing the lawn with the once-dead, now fully charged battery. However, after five minutes, the battery died. I put it back into the charger, and the red light glared at me, refusing to recognize the battery. Frustrated but undaunted, I switched to the other battery and completed mowing the lawn.

I charged the “good” battery after deciding the other was a lost cause and needed replacement. Daniel, stubborn and not to be deterred, tried again, this time telling me he did a more professional job charging, so it should be fully charged.

I mowed, and it died again and turned red in the charger.

He has again guaranteed to me that it is fully charged. So, tomorrow’s lawn mowing will be the final test. Since I know we have one good battery and the mowing season is ending, I won’t replace the bad one until next spring. Soon, mowing will be replaced by raking, and elbow grease, not batteries, supplies the energy.

We have gone keyless, and all our exterior doors have battery-operated locks. Recently, the front door lock has been having glitches. I assumed it needed a new battery, and although it might have, that was not the problem with the inoperable lock. While Daniel was out of town, my neighbor came to diagnose and hopefully fix the tricky door. He took the mechanism apart and fixed it with the caveat that it could be a temporary fix and that we may need new hardware.

After he returned, I told Daniel we may need a new lock. Of course, he first had to take the lock apart to see if he could make a permanent fix. But lo and behold, even he gave up, at least for now. Meanwhile, he exchanged a lock from one of our other doors to the front door. I hope that the battery is fully charged.

Daniel is working double shifts this week, after which his energy source will be depleted, but no, I won’t replace him.

Spaghetti a la Chief

The Chief was a terrific cook, his specialty being spaghetti with meat sauce. (A lot of pasta went into building that physique.) This dish took all day to prepare and required a few bottles of red wine to keep the chef hydrated. The secret to this sauce is chopping all the ingredients to the same size. So, grab a bottle of Chianti and get cooking.

Ingredients

Meatballs

- 2 slices of white bread
- 4 tablespoons of grated Parmesan cheese
- ½ cup of milk
- 2 tablespoons of chopped garlic
- 2 pounds (approx. 1kg.) of ground beef
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup of finely chopped onions
- Water
- 3 tablespoons of chopped fresh parsley
- 3 tablespoons of olive oil
- 2 eggs

Directions

In a bowl, soak the bread in the milk. In a medium bowl, mix the ground beef, bread, milk, onions, parsley, eggs, cheese, and garlic. Add salt and pepper. If the mixture is dry, add up to a ½ cup of cold water and mix well. Form the mixture into two meatballs.

Heat the olive oil in a sauté pan over medium to high heat. Brown the meatballs for 10-15 minutes, turning regularly. Dry the meatballs on paper towels.

Sauce

- ½ cup of olive oil
- 1 lb (appx 500g) mild sausage
- 1 lb (500g) sliced skinless chicken thighs
- ½ lb (200g) of hot Italian sausage
- 1 cup of diced pancetta
- 6 thinly sliced pork chops
- 1 tablespoon crushed red pepper
- 2 cups of dry red wine, (plus some more for the cook)
- 2 cans Italian plum tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons chopped garlic
- 2 cups of fresh basil
- 2 onions, chopped
- 2 lbs (1kg) uncooked spaghetti

Directions

In a large pot over medium heat, warm the oil, and sauté the sausages, chicken thighs and pork chops until brown about 10 minutes. Don't worry if the meat is not cooked through, it will finish in the sauce.

Remove the meat from the pan and set aside. Keep the pan over medium heat. Deglaze the pan by adding a cup of the wine and scraping up the bits.

In the same pot add the garlic, onions, pancetta, and crusted pepper and cook until the onions and garlic are lightly browned, about 2 minutes. Add the remaining cup of red wine and cook until the mixture is reduced by half. Add the tomatoes and simmer for 1 hour over low heat.

Add the basil, sausage, pork chops, and the meatballs to the tomato sauce and simmer for one more hour over low heat.

In a large pot of boiling salted water, cook the pasta for 10-12 minutes or until al dente.

Drain the pasta and toss it with the sauce. Serve immediately.
