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Waitsburg Secondary School starts each day with an assembly

WAITSBURG — Waitsburg secondary students and staff meet in the Cage before each day before school begins. It is an opportunity for Secondary Principal Joe Wirtzberger and his staff to foster a positive environment and help students smoothly transition to the classroom after the morning bell.

Wirtzberger makes the daily announcements, followed by faculty and student shout-outs. A teacher starts the week by giv ing a shout-out to a student. That student will give a shout-out to someone the following morning, and the process continues.

The assembly stands together to recite the Pledge of Allegiance and sing the school's fight song. On Fridays, teacher Dan Nechodom invites a local Veteran to lead the school in the Pledge of Allegiance.

"I was reflecting on how, despite the fact that some schools are moving away from regularly reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, I have essentially not missed a day since I started teaching in 1992," said Nechodom.

Nechodom said the idea of inviting Veterans to the assemblies came from a friend, Lanny Adams, who posts the Pledge on his Facebook page each day. He invited Adams to an assembly, and the idea to invite others, including Jim Duncan and Jim Romine, sprang from there. The experience gives students a chance to recognize some of the people who work hard and sacrifice much on their behalf.

On Friday, November 21, teacher Elizabeth Jagelski's father, Juan Arabelos, and husband, Tom Jagelski, were invited to lead the Pledge. Arabelos received a Purple Heart while serving in the 24th Division -19th Regiment from 1949 to 1952. Jagelski was an Army artilleryman and served from 1969 to 1971.

"As you can see, many of the things we do here start with staff ideas. One of the best parts of my job is giving our staff the space to bring forward great ideas and then getting out of their way so they can make them happen," said Wirtzberger.

Dayton School to get management software update

DAYTON — The Dayton School Board held its regular meeting on November 19, 2025. Superintendent Jeremy Wheatley, Board Chair Jeffrey McCowen, and board members Pat Davidson, Grant Griffin, and Ryan Paulson were present in the school library. Aneesha Dieu joined via Zoom.

The board approved the consent agenda, including Shannon McMillen as a volunteer HS Girls Basketball coach and accepted a \$1,000 donation from Puget Sound Energy for warm winter clothing.

Lucy Trump gave the ASB report, covering homecoming week activities, including the dance at The Scotsman, attended by 70 students.

The board's student representative's report veered into a discussion on proposed repairs to the gym, including replacing the 60-year-old gym floor in the coming year.

Athletic Director Sam Korslund said fall sports have wrapped up, and winter sports are underway. Presently, the high school's participation numbers are 13 for boys' basketball, 12 for girls' basketball, six for wrestling, and three for cheer. Middle school has 13 boys and 15 girls signed up for basketball, four for MS

Korslund reported gains in gate revenue from football, volleyball, and basketball, which have pushed the athletic program into profitability. In recent seasons, it has operated at a

John Delp said the classroom environment has improved this year in his maintenance, operations, and grounds report. He said only heat pump #3 was negatively affecting classrooms, possibly due to a faulty installation. It should be repaired over the Thanksgiving holiday.

Wheatley presented Amy Cox's report. Highlights included auditions for the Brutus the Bulldog mascot, and plans for some classes to walk to the River Walk assisted living center to sing

Wheatley's superintendent's report touched on future projects, including new overhead doors, security improvements, solar power, and the gym floor.

Business Manager Jana Eaton said the district will have an accountability audit for about the fourth year in a row. She said

the new 30 and 36-passenger buses will soon be in operation. Eaton said that the district's administrative software, which tracks grades, attendance, human resources, and overall education management, will be upgraded in July. She said the

product migration from Skyward's current product to its new program, Qmlativ, has been planned for years.

The board approved the first and second readings of Policy 1111, which updates the board members oath of office, to say they will support the constitutions of the United States and the State of Washington, and the laws of the State of Washington. "Supporting the laws of the State of Washington" was not previously in the oath. The board also approved the first and second readings of Policy 2170 regarding career and technical educa-

The meeting adjourned at 7:55 p.m. to go into an executive session to discuss a complaint against staff or a program.

The theater is accepting non-perishable food donations in support of Dayton's local food bank.


For Dayton's Christmas Kickoff, the theater will show "ELF" on Friday, November 28, at 3 p.m. Admission is free.

DAYTON MAYOR SUPPORTS CITY'S PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR

Letter to the Editor

To the citizens of our beautiful Dayton, I'd like the opportunity as your elected Mayor to address a few situations and clarify some things that have recently been floating around the different channels of information we have at our fingertips. Some folks prefer the newspaper, some prefer the internet, and others utilize good old-fashioned face-to-face con-

Some things recently have made "headlines" on social media, spreading false information about the City's Public Works Director, Ryan Paulson. He has only been here for a short four years and has been a key member of our team in successfully obtaining millions of grant dollars for the infrastructure of our city, which we would not have had without him.


The Main Street sidewalks in his first year brought in \$80,000 in 100% grant dollars. The 3rd Street project, North and South of Main Street, was about \$3.5 million with a 5% match. The 4th Street project, starting with the ADA Sidewalk portion of the Complete Streets Project, Phase I, is being awarded about \$495,000, with the city only paying 5% match. Phase II of the 4th Street project was a combined effort with Columbia County that had a total awarded cost of about \$2,200,000. This portion of the project was 100% funded grant with no cost to the city. There was also the Otta Seal project, which was an experimental State Project that was used in different communities across the state, which if it produced good results, would be a less expensive way to help in the life of the road structure. This project was awarded \$2,000,000 with a 5% match. It did not have the outcome desired, so Ryan worked with the funding agency to procure a second phase, which this year put out conventional 3/8" chipseal and made this project very successful, and continues to work toward securing additional funds to continue this project. These next two years, he also has received another \$2,750,000 for Main Street improvements that will have only a 5% matching cost to the City of

Moving on, there are grant dollars already secured to put toward the building of a new Wastewater Treatment plant. Ryan and Deb have been working on this project for a few years, working with Anderson Perry and Associates, Department of Ecology, State Department of Commerce and State Representatives Joe Schmick, Mark Schessler and Mary Dye. Ryan was successful in obtaining a state appropriation of \$1,000,000 with no cost to the city.

I challenge anyone to come up with an individual, in any city, that has changed the direction of a community as much and fast as Ryan Paulson has for the City of Dayton. He has every ability to leave and make another community better. He and his wife, raising their children, have chosen to make Dayton their home. He strives to improve the attitudes toward success for the City of Dayton. You won't find a more dedicated employee that actually wants to stay in a community and not worry about people wanting to degrade him and his integrity.

ORDINANCE SUMMARY

Pursuant to RCW 35.30.018, the Council of the City of Waitsburg hereby approves for publication the following Ordinance Summary:

1. The name of the City is the City of Waitsburg, Washington. 2. The Ordinance summarized is Ordinance No. 2025-1099, adopted by the Council of the City of Waitsburg on November 19, 2025 (the "Ordinance").

The Ordinance authorizes the acquisition, condemnation. appropriation, and taking of an easement for the repair, improvement, replacement, and maintenance of the levee system on the property commonly known as 782 Preston Avenue

4. The Ordinance is summarized as follows:

a. The Ordinance is divided into six sections.

b. Section 1 explains that the access and maintenance easement is required to serve a public use by reducing the risk of future flooding and preventing damage through out the City.

c. Section 2 declares the easement to be condemned and taken for the purpose of repairing, improving, and maintaining the levee system, subject to the payment of just compensation to the owner

d. Section 3 directs the City Attorney to begin legal condemnation proceedings to carry out the provisions of the Ordinance.

e. Section 4 provides that compensation for the acquisition of the easement shall be paid from the general funds of the City of Waitsburg.

f. Section 5 states that if any provision of the Ordinance is declared invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.

g. Section 6 states that the Ordinance will take effect 5 days after passage and publication.

5. A copy of the entire Ordinance will be mailed upon request or may be examined at City Hall.



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
